Between 2009 and 2014, I was the editorial producer for *Life Reimagined*, a monthly segment on NBC’s TODAY Show hosted by Jane Pauley and co-produced by AARP.

In 2012, I produced “Zydeco Nation,” a one-hour radio documentary about the Louisiana Creole migration to California and the rise of the West Coast zydeco scene, funded by the California Council for the Humanities.

In 2011, I produced a series of fourteen radio stories about the BP oil spill for Louisiana Public Broadcasting’s GulfWatch project.

In 2010, I produced a two-hour documentary series called “Still Singing the Blues,” funded by the Louisiana Endowment for the Humanities.

Between 2007 and 2010, I was a collaborator on three hour-long radio documentaries for Prime Time Radio: “Voices of Katrina” (reporter, narrator), “Truckin’ My Blues Away” (producer, reporter), and the Gracie-winning “Picking Up The Pieces: How Family and Faith Are Healing Veterans Home From War” (co-producer, reporter, narrator).
